Second priority is given to applicants who can demonstrate need based on family income. All first-priority applicants are awarded before any second-priority applicants are considered. 



Mr. Turner also presented the Georgia Department of Transportation's Daily Fatality Report, a copy of which is below.



Mr. Turner stated that, unless there were objections from Commission members, he planned to cease allowing providers to amend contracts to increase their fees, effective today, September 29, 2025. The board voted in March to grant Mr. Turner the authority to establish the necessary procedures for providers to amend their rates due to the increase in maximum reimbursements allowed. Mr. Turner stated that providers have been given ample time to amend contracts and he believes it is time to resume standard operations. He also acknowledged Ms. Bell for her efforts in assisting providers with amending their contracts.

Finally, Mr. Turner acknowledged Anna Rountree, a student at a driver's education provider, who tragically passed away last month. Anna had completed the 30-hour classroom component of her driver's education program and was awaiting behind-the-wheel training when she was involved in a fatal collision on August 20, 2025. Her passing serves as a solemn reminder of the significance of the Commission's mission.

Mr. Turner extended his appreciation to the Governor's Office of Highway Safety and the Drivers Education Commission for their continued dedication.

The Commission members engaged in further discussion and questions regarding Mr. Turner's proposal to stop accepting contract amendments for fee increases. The Commission raised no objections to discontinuing the acceptance of such amendments.

Mr. Schrenk made a motion to approve the staff report. Dr. Daniel seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Consider Adoption of Fiscal Year 2025 Annual Report

Mr. Turner presented the Fiscal Year 2025 Annual Report. He highlighted the following:

- According to the most recent data available from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS), there were 176 young drivers (15–20 years old) involved in fatal crashes on Georgia roadways in 2023.
- In 2023, young drivers represented 8% of all drivers involved in fatal crashes similar to the previous year.
- In 2023, there were 69,348 crashes that involved young drivers in Georgia.
- The most common harmful event in single-vehicle crashes involving young drivers was speeding too fast for conditions and losing control of the vehicle, as opposed to distracted driving in the previous year.
- The top contributing factors among young drivers and other drivers involved in multivehicle crashes were following too closely and failure to yield the right of way. Additionally, 10% of all young drivers involved in any traffic crash were confirmed or suspected of distracted driving.
- In Fiscal Year 2025, 57% of young drivers seeking to obtain a Provisional License (Class D) used Method 4 to satisfy Joshua's Law, while 32% used Method 1, 7% used Method 3, and 4% used Method 2.
- The increase in the maximum reimbursement rate for the scholarship program is referenced in the Commission history section.
- In FY2025, a total of 8,147 applicants applied for the Georgia Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program. Of these, 1,574 applicants did not qualify based on family income eligibility requirements. The Commission awarded 6,552 scholarships 8 out of every 10 applicants received funding. Among those who met eligibility requirements, 99% were awarded a scholarship. Compared to the previous fiscal year, the number of scholarships awarded increased by 35%.
- Of the 6,552 scholarships awarded, 5,523 students (84%) redeemed their scholarships and completed driver's education through an authorized provider in FY2025, representing a total value of \$2,627,129 paid through the grant program.

Mr. Turner thanked Ms. Shenee Bryan, Contract Epidemiologist for the Commission, for compiling the report. He also requested that any motion approving the report include authorization for staff to correct any identified scrivener's errors.

Dr. Daniel made a motion to adopt the Fiscal Year 2025 Annual Report and to allow staff to correct any scrivener's errors identified. Mr. Schrenk seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. The motion passed unanimously.

Consider Amendments to the Georgia Driver's Education Commission Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program Eligibility Requirements

Mr. Turner presented the proposed changes to the Program Eligibility Requirements. A copy of the proposed changes is included below.

Georgia Driver's Education Commission |
Driver's Education Crant Scholarship Program
Eligibility Requirements (Adopted 9/26/16 and Amended on 11/16/16; 3/21/17[±], 6/26/17[±], 9/26/17[±], 3/27/18°, 3/26/19°[±], 6/10/22°[±], and 3/17/2026[±]), and 9/29/2025[±].)

A. Student Eligibility

- The student must be a resident of the State of Georgia and actively enrolled in school
 The student must be between the ages of fifteen and seventeen and possess a valid
- The student must be between the ages of fifteen and seventeen and possess a valid Georgia instructional driving permit or driver's license.
- Firstpriority will be given to grant scholarship applicants who are a child or dependent of
 a Georgia first responder disabled or killed in the line of duty or member of the United
 States military killed in action and to applicants who are in state custody under the care of
 the Georgia Department of Family and Children Services. If the applicant is a child or
 dependent of a Georgia first responder disabled or killed in the line of duty, the applicant
 must identify said professional and provide a copy of the student applicant's birth
 certificate or other government issued documentation proving the student was a
 dependent of the identified Georgia first responder. For purposes of this grant scholarship
 program, the Georgia Driver's Education Commission will rely on the Georgia Public
 Safety Memorial Committee to identify a Georgia first responder killed in the line of
 duty. For purposes of this grant scholarship program, the Georgia First esponder
 Commission will rely on O.C.G.A.§ 35-8-7.4 (a) to identify and define a Georgia first
 responder. If the applicant is a child or dependent of a Georgia first responder disabled in
 the line of duty, the applicant must provide of letter of disability. If the applicant is under
 the care of the Georgia Department of Family and Children Services, the applicant must
 submit a letter documenting custody from the Georgia Department of Family and
 Children Services, Grant scholarship allocations in this priority level will be evenly
 distributed among Georgia's United States congressional districts.
 Second priority will be given to scholarship applicants who can demonstrate a need based
- 4. Second priority will be given to scholarship applicants who can demonstrate a need based on family income. Financial need eligibility will be based on 175% of the Free and Reduced Price Meal Eligibility program for the State of Georgia as published by the Georgia Department of Education. The Commission authorizes agency staff to make necessary technical adjustments to the Georgia Driver's Education Grant Scholarship Program application and award process to ensure that the eligibility level is appropriately adjusted as the financial need eligibility for the Free and Reduced Price Meal program is increased or decreased by the Georgia Department of Education. Grant scholarship allocations in this priority level will be evenly distributed among Georgia's United States concressional districts.

- 6. Grant scholarships will be awarded monthly, except for the months of June and July. In June, the Director of the Georgia Driver's Education Commission, subject to available funding and at his discretion, is given authority to process an additional scholarship award cycle on the 30th of the month. In the event that an additional scholarship award cycle is processed on June 30 $^{\circ}$, the scholarship award process on the following July 1° 1 will not occur and the monthly scholarship award process will resume on August 1 4. Grant scholarship applications are due on the last day of every month. Grant Scholarship awards and denials will be issued on the 1st day of each following month, except as vein instances where the scholarship award is processed on June 30th when such awards and denials will be issued on August 1st, and will be sent by electronic mail. The number of grant scholarships available to be awarded will be determined by staff and entered into the grant scholarship management system. Grant scholarships will be awarded based on the priority levels defined above. All of All the applicants in the meeting the requirements for first priority will be awarded before the second priority applicants. If more grant scholarship applications are submitted than there are grant scholarships available in each priority level, grant scholarships will be awarded using a comp generated computer generated random selection method from the priority level sations. The grant scholarship will be awarded in the form of a voucher to the student. The student may then take said voucher to an eligible Authorized Provider. The Authorized Provider will then submit the voucher to the Commission for reimbursement as set forth herein
- Students are only eligible to apply for a grant scholarship e application is rejected, the application will be reconsidered for the following two months
- and given priority over new applicants.

 Scholarships are only valid for students who agree to complete a standard 30/6 driver's education course in which the student receives a minimum of thirty (30) hours of classroom training and six (6) hours of <u>bahind the wheel</u> training. Additionally, the student's parent or guardian must be a co-applicant and agree to complete forty hours of supervised driving with the student. Additionally, the scholarship must be awarded prior the start date of the driver's education course.
- 9. Students will only be awarded one scholarship. In the event of a failure or withdrawal
- from the course, the student will not be eligible to apply for another scholarship.

 10. Grant Scholarship awardees must identify the provider of choice from a list of authorized providers and redeem the grant scholarship with the provider within 30 days of the grant scholarship award notice. Further, the driver's education course must be completed within 180 days of the grant scholarship award date. If a scholarship is not redeemed after 30 days of notice of the award and the course is not completed within 180 days of notice of the award of the grant scholarship by the student, the grant scholarship is forfestedforfeited, and the student loses the scholarship and eligibility to apply again in the future. Students and providers may petition the Chairman of the Georgia Driver's

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Education Commission, or his designee, for a one-time 60 day 60-day extension of these deadlines. Additional requests will be considered with a proven medical reason from a physician necessitating the addition time extension

- - Provider eligibility is open to the following types of providers:
 a. Public and private high schools that are licensed by the Georgia Departs Driver Services.
 - Private driving schools (commercial for profit, and not for profit) that are licensed by the Georgia Department of Drivers Services and that have been licensed for a minimum of two years.
 - c. Technical Colleges, Colleges, Universities and State Agencies that are authorized to provide driver's education by their governing bodies and that meet the minimum standards for drivers training and driver's education set forth by said governing body.
 - In order to 10 participate in the scholarship program, providers must submit a completed Provider Application and meet the minimum qualifications set forth in these requirements. All providers must agree to abide by the State of Georgia vendor requirements including, but not limited to, compliance with the Statewide Sexual Harassment Prevention Policy in accordance with Executive Order 01.14.19.02, the submission of a Form W-9. 
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
